O1 Seniors Feeding Program





Born to an Islamic family to practiced polygamy, Halima Noor was raised in Isiolo North, Kambi Juu area. She remembers having eleven siblings with her being the eighth born in the family. Halima did not attend school and during that time it was customary to get married while young and often to an older man.

Her marriage was arranged which meant that her parents choose her future husband. She got married and the couple was blessed with eight children. Her husband had a job at the local postal bank as a messenger. He was the sole provider of the family as Halima was a stay-at-home mum.

Over the year, she some of her children and had the heartache of losing her husband to a short illness. She was left a widow and with the huge responsibility of caring for her children. It was a challenge for her, but Halima did not accept defeat. With fortitude she rose to the occasion and found ways to survive. She went round the nearby neighborhood and secured a job as a domestic worker. She was able to provide for children but not without challenges as she had to endure more loss when some children passed on" it was at this time that I felt so alone and scared, but somehow, I found the courage within me to keep pushing." Halima narrated.

Years later Halima become sick and had to be hospitalized. This forced her to quit working because it became detrimental to her health. She had four children left and they remained jobless making them it difficult to assist their mother financially. Halima resulted to begging relatives and neighbors in order to survive.

Currently, Halima lives with some of her family members, her daughter is has become her main caregiver and her son who suffers from diabetes, together with his wife and children. She has been part of the seniors feeding program for seven years making her the sole breadwinner of the family.

SENIORS FEEDING PROGRAM





Patrick Nangabo Akola was born in 1962 in Shimuli village within Kakamega County in a polygamous family with three mothers and 12 siblings. As a result, his childhood was characterized of co-wives' rivalry that saw most of them miss out on basic education.

He recalls his childhood years being spent on playing football, fetching firewood, catering to cattle and most times watching other children go to school. Unfortunately, his parents separated and he spent his remaining childhood and adolescent years in his maternal home where his uncle took care of him. When he became of age, he ventured out to major towns such as Kakamega and Eldoret to work as a Laborer and security quard as a way of earning some cash for his upkeep and his mum sustenance.

In 2005, He moved to Kakamega town and settled down with his wife whom they were blessed with 3 children in the Majengo informal settlement. Through his entire life, he worked as a temporary security guard who secured short term contracts that lasted upto 3 to 5 months in a year. This way of life confined him to abject poverty, forcing his wife to leave with all his children.

Despite all these challenges, he remained hopeful for brighter days ahead. In 2018, he enrolled into the Seniors' feeding program with Mama Ibado Charity from which he has been receiving a monthly food ration. This rations have supported him and his brother and effectively inspired positive changes. Patrick's household poverty rate decreased, he witnessed nutritional upgrades and increased energy while engaging in his daily work as a security guard within Amalemba Shopping Centre.

He extends his gratitude to all those who contribute to his monthly food rations and prays that their resources never run dry.




Highlights Of The Month
